City's Passport Facility Reaches Two Years of Service

THE CITY'S PASSPORT facility has accepted over 6,158 passport applications since its opening on October 10, 2016. The service has proved to be an added convenience for our residents and the residents of neighboring communities. The office, located at 10246 N Canyon Road, is open for passport applications Mondays through Thursdays from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Fridays from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., excluding holidays. Whooping Cough on the Rise in Utah County Receive or Ensure Pertussis Vaccination

The Utah County Health Department (UCHD) is experiencing an increase of Pertussis cases, many in infants and young children. UCHD anticipates even more cases, now that school is back in session. The number of cases at this point in the year is almost double that of the same time frame in 2017.

Pertussis, or whooping cough, is a contagious disease characterized by cold symptoms such as runny nose and an irritating cough. Pertussis can be life-threatening in small children. In previously immunized teenagers and adults it frequently presents as a very persistent and sometimes severe cough that lasts for weeks. It may also present as a very mild cough that may be mistaken as a viral respiratory illness.

Dr. David Flinders, Medical Director for UCHD notes that "Regardless of the cough intensity, pertussis can be spread to others, including unimmunized infants, who are at such high risk, especially those who have not yet been immunized."

Vaccination is the best prevention against pertussis. A booster vaccine (Tdap) is available to teenagers and adults. This vaccine is recommended, as neither the childhood vaccine nor the illness create a lifelong immunity to the disease.

The vaccines are available from your primary healthcare provider or most local pharmacies, including the Walmart in Cedar Hills.

Mayor's Message

In the summer of 2017 the city gave notice to Lone Peak Public Safety District (our current provider for fire and EMS services) and American Fork Police Department (our current provider for police services) that we planned to bid for public safety services to research all options available to us. This was not to suggest that we were unhappy with the services provided by either entity, but, as public safety expenses have steadily increased and our revenues have not, we wanted to determine our options, just as we do with other service contracts.

We received bids from Lone Peak Public Safety, American Fork City, and Pleasant Grove City for both services, and we received a bid from Utah County to provide police services only. As part of this process we interviewed each entity individually, analyzed our call volumes for police and fire, and forecasted our expected budget revenues for the next several years.

At the City Council meeting on September 18 the decision was made to go with American Fork for both fire and police services, effective July 1, 2019. At that time American Fork will continue with our existing police services and will staff our current fire station with fire and EMS personnel. At some point American Fork will build a new fire station on the land south of Lone Peak High School and across from our commercial zone. While we expect

response times from that new facility will continue to be within industry standards, American Fork is willing to amend our agreement to provide some staffing at our current station, if we determine that is needed.

We wish to express appreciation to those in the police and fire departments who provided their services to our community over the past 20 years. This decision

was not easy, as all of the entities that submitted a proposal consist of highly qualified and experienced individuals who are dedicated to protecting the communities they serve. Our goal is to continue to provide high-quality service, while also planning for our future needs, with the understanding that our city will not be experiencing much new growth.

STORM DRAIN TIP OF THE MONTH

What you do makes a difference!

You might not think that you can help solve the problem, but you can! The average home can accumulate as much as 100 pounds of chemical waste each year from common household and lawn and garden products such as: paint, paint thinners, cleaning solutions, degreasers, pesticides, weed killers, fertilizers, antifreeze, motor oil, gasoline, and diesel fuel. Proper disposal of chemical waste helps protect our water systems.

Pressurized Irrigation Begins Winterization

This year the city's pressurized irrigation system will be winterized between October 10 and 15. After that time, major secondary water sources are no longer available to the city. After October 15 please leave your individual, pressurized irrigation shut-off valve in the "open" position for a time to allow for proper drainage. Prior to the system being energized in the spring, you will need to "close" the individual shut-off valve to prevent possible damage to the system's components caused by the burst of high pressure. If your sprinkler system is still in service after October 18, please notify the Public Works Department for a free system examination.



Open Burning Prohibited This Year

To reduce risk of wildfires, open burning during the normally open-burn window from Sept. 15 through Oct. 30 is prohibited. This includes recreational fires in fire pits and any fireworks or other pyrotechnic display. No permits will be issued, and strict enforcement will be in place.

Parking on Public Streets

We need everyone's co-operation to keep our streets clean and safe. It is in violation for residents to use public streets and right-of-ways for parking or storage of trailers, RV's, boats, campers, or basketball standards. It is also unlawful to park any vehicle in the same location on a street or municipal property for a continuous period of more than 48 hours. Vehicles in violation may be subject to citation, fees, and/or towing. Thank you for your cooperation in making our city a beautiful and safe community.

Sidewalk Improvements Planned

Contractors will be completing sidewalk improvements on Cedar Hills Drive and 4600 West through October to install ADA compliant accesses.

Restrooms in the city's parks will remain open until October 31, if temperatures stay above freezing.

City Approves Accessory Dwelling Units

Earlier this year the State Legislature passed a new law, mandating cities to include a moderate income housing element in their general plan. As a result, the City Council updated and approved a new ordinance allowing accessory apartments or Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) in Cedar Hills.

Cities are now required to report and publish data, which indicate the number of units that qualify as low-income and moderate-income housing. Since some accessory apartments may qualify, the City Council has worked toward meeting all State requirements by adopting the new ordinance, which will make it easier for residents to own and operate ADUs within Cedar Hills. In addition, implementing this plan will keep revenues and grants in the City of Cedar Hills (Utah State Code 10-9a-403).

To encourage residents to register their accessory apartments with the city, the staff has streamlined an online registration process with forms, instructions and the benefits of registering their apartment. Visit cedarhills.org/adu for all the information.
